Porcelain Art with Zilla Wong

Come along to a multi-day workshop and experience the unique art form of Porcelain Art. This class is open to everyone regardless of your skill level. Learn new techniques or paint what you already know. Communal use of paints, brushes & mediums will be supplied, though please bring along three small pieces of white porcelain per session and pictures of flowers, fruits, birds, small animals, etc, that you would like to paint.

New technique will be introduced: Use of Decals

As decals are not part of the communal materials, a small cost less than \$1.50 (in addition to the class fees) will be collected separately by the Tutor to cover the costs.

Equipment required: Three pieces of white porcelain around the size of a side plate per session.

Regular enrolled students please read materials list regarding items that they should bring along.

Please do not bring stoneware or bone china, only porcelain.



Get To Know Your Art Materials with Lyn Williamson

Mastering any creative work requires you to know how to use your materials and tools. In this short session we will find out what art materials are and how to use what you have so you do not buy what you do not need. How to find the materials to make your work easier. Getting to know your own art supplies and a short history of art materials and the myths that can be debunked. As Picasso said "you need to know the rules, to break the rules". Regardless of the mediums in art you use, you will find some useful information to help you in your art creation journey.

History Alive with Susie King

The Rise of Fascism in the First Half of the 20th Century

With the rise of extreme right-wing groups in a number of countries today, the Rise of Fascism in the Twentieth Century becomes even more topical and relevant. History Alive will look at the rise of Fascism in a selected number of countries – Italy, Germany, Australia and Britain. What does Fascism mean? Why did it receive mass support in

some countries but remain a minority group in others? Using a variety of sources and examples, the causes, progress and consequences of Fascism will be explored in the first half of the Nineteenth Century.

Session 1: Mussolini's Italy

Italy is closely associated with the Renaissance and the arts and yet shortly after WWI it embraced an altogether different world, that of Mussolini and his Black Shirts. Why and how did Mussolini achieve this and go on to set the model for other fascist groups?

Session 2: Hitler's Germany

Following WWI, a defeated and crushed Germany had democracy imposed, in part, by the victorious Allies. Find out how Hitler exploited this and the Great Depression to form a Nazi Dictatorship which was to have an impact on much of the modern world.

Session 3: New Guards and Brownshirts – A Challenge to Democracy

Australia and Britain had long and established democracies. They were to be challenged both from the right and left of politics with many believing that Fascism was less of a threat than Communism. Who led the Fascists in Australia and Britain and how successful were they? Why has the far right become more popular again?

During that time he travelled extensively to Asia and met with many dignitaries in his efforts to promote the State of WA. He was also responsible for numerous capital developments in WA.
